



BUILDING RAPPORT

- Adhesives bring people together and help build mutual understanding and lasting relationships.
- **Bridges** act as a go-between, allowing people in different functions or geographies to collaborate with minimal disruption to their day-to-day routine. Bridges are most effective when they have considerable knowledge of both sides and can figure out what each one needs.
- Curious and empathetic individuals will be more effective at acting as a bridge or adhesive to cross-siloed partners.

CURRENT CHALLENGES GAP ANALYSIS



An average of 7% of individuals on the frontline of victim identification feel equipped to identify and report trafficking.



The limited capacity of trafficking services means survivors cannot always access needed services.



Legislation and policy needs to be strengthened to decrease the demand, strengthen survivor protections, and prevent trafficking.



CURRENT CHALLENGES GAP ANALYSIS



There is no centralized system for connecting survivors with qualified human trafficking services. If survivors do not receive support, they cost taxpayers \$5.3M over their lifetime.




Data is not shared and aggregated across entities to inform investigations, identify trends, and create predictive models for solutions.



The investment into domestic anti-trafficking efforts is only 4% of the illegal revenue of the domestic trafficking industry annually.





Race of Survivor




Location When Seeking Support



SHP SURVIVOR DEMOGRAPHICS

- > 92% of survivors seeking support were female.
- > 4% of survivors seeking support were male.
- > 4% of survivors seeking support were transgender or nonbinary.

Did you know? Even though females are disproportionately identified, the DOJ estimates that 33% of minor victims are male.



SURVIVOR SUPPORT TRENDS



92% faced mental health challenges, 33% being severe



9.5% needed emergency mental health stabilization, 54% of whom referred themselves



63% are willing to be placed out of state



14.7% had pending legal charges preventing placement out-of-state



58% are willing to go to a faith-based program



26.5% reported illicit drug use within a few weeks of needing support



31.2% of survivors have children at the time of request



58% of placed survivors were still in care at 90 days



16.8% do not have valid ID when seeking support, posing challenges for traveling



53% vape or smoke cigarettes, 85% of whom are willing to quit to enter a program




TEST THE TARGETS

HITTING THE TARGET



Constantly learning together.

- Collaboration has growing pains.
- It's rare that a team or person experiences perfect performance right out of the gate.
- Defining the influenceable goals of the team helps intrinsically motivate someone to succeed.
- Clarity around outcomes or big goals will help inform the influenceable goals at the individual or team level.
- Learn from the data you miss the target.
- Implement and grow when you hit the target.
- Constantly flowing between discovery and deployment will increase the number of times the field hits the target.





EMERGENCY REFERRAL

How We Can Help You Serve Trafficking Survivors

- We can connect trafficking survivors with emergency shelters if they are unhoused or unsafe.
- We find care that fits the trafficking survivor's needs in long-term or transitional programs.
- We can cover all transportation costs (including hotel and meals if necessary) once the trafficking survivor is accepted to an approved program.
- We can connect trafficking survivors with resources for detox and mental health stabilization.
- We respond to calls for help by the next business day
- We help trafficking survivors of any age, gender, or background, anywhere in the United States.
- We follow up with our trafficking survivors at 30, 60, and 90 days.








TRAFFICKING SURVIVOR **EQUITY COALITION**

The Trafficking Survivor Equity Coalition (TSEC) brings survivor-informed and anti-trafficking-field-informed policy recommendations to educate lawmakers on how to effectively prevent trafficking, protect trafficking survivors through equitable and inclusive services, and prosecute traffickers through effective legislation. TSEC supports a holistic approach to serving human trafficking survivors and elevating lived experience experts in the United States.





2024 SAFE HOUSE PROJECT GRANT

INCREASING ACCESS TO SAFE HOUSING & HOLISTIC CARE FOR SURVIVORS OF TRAFFICKING

Overview

Safe House Project partners with local organizations across the United States, serving trafficking survivors through therapeutic housing solutions by providing funding, training, certification, and development. To date, Safe House Project has helped fund 478 new beds in the national landscape. We believe that through collaboration and partnership, the anti-trafficking industry can eradicate trafficking. We look forward to hearing about the incredible work your organization does to serve people impacted by trafficking.

Eligibility

501c(3) organizations located in the United States providing or seeking to provide therapeutic residential care/housing solutions for sex trafficking survivors. Programs serving any gender and any age range may apply. Unopened programs with a projected launch date prior to April 2025 are also eligible.

Funding Priorities

People and Programs: Safe House Project does not fund existing daily operating costs or capital campaigns.

Capacity Building: New or expanding programs providing residential services to sex trafficking survivors may apply. Programs must show how they are increasing the national capacity of care for trafficking victims.

Decreasing Barriers to Care: Existing programs may show how they are decreasing an existing barrier to care by creating infrastructure to reduce their current disqualifiers for acceptance. For example, a program that has historically been unable to serve those with extreme mental health challenges is seeking funds to provide psychiatric care to provide more victims with opportunities for placement.



BADGE OF HOPE

Gold Safe House Badge

Gold badges are reserved for programs offering the highest level of survivor care. Programs with a gold badge are meeting industry best-practices overall, and continually pushing themselves through self-assessment and survivor feedback to continue elevating their program. Certification is held for 3 years.



Silver Safe House Badge

Awarded to programs providing the second highest level of care. Programs with a silver badge are offering program and services that meet many industry best-practices, with notable room for improvement. Silver badge recipients are committed to serving survivors and working toward continuous improvement in their standard of care. Certification is held for 2 years.



Bronze Safe House Badge

Bronze badges are awarded to organizations achieving the industry's basic level of survivor care, but reflects minimal best-practices and has marked room for improvement. Certification is held for 1 year.



Specialized Care Badge

Specialized Care Badges are awarded to programs seeking to serve all survivors, including those requiring specialized care. This badge is reserved for programs equipped to assist survivors with disabilities and other complex physical and mental health needs. Specialized Care Badge recipients are committed to providing special needs survivors care that meets industry best-practices.
