

THE PROBLEM

80% of trafficking victims end up re-victimized without receiving effective services.

- There is a no transparency or standards around programs.
- Most lack trafficking specific programming.

THE NEED

Survivors need service providers who are certified to serve human trafficking victims with effective programming.

- Create consistency of care for trafficking survivors.
- Programs need clear guidelines and programmatic training.
- Quality programming to prevent re-victimization.

THE SOLUTION

Certification elevates programs providing ethical, safe, therapeutic, well resourced, and sustainable residential programs to survivors.

- National standards that provide clearly defined programming for serving human trafficking survivors
- Organizational oversight to determine effectiveness, transparency, and sustainability of programs.


HOW IS A PROGRAM EVALUATED?

Safe House Project collaborated with industry experts, including survivor leaders, restorative care partners, mental health professionals, and agencies to establish a methodology of best practices to evaluate aftercare programs serving human trafficking survivors.

Safe House Certification is a pathway to improved operations and enhanced effectiveness of residential aftercare programs. Over time, these best practices will turn into standard practices for organizations.

The full process of evaluation takes approximately 2-3 months to complete, pending the prompt scheduling of the Site Visit.
