



Survivor Placements in Q1 2023



Age Breakdown Q1 2023




A Day in the Life of our Survivor Support Team

In a 3 hour period, we received calls to help place five survivors:

- Adult survivor with a service dog
- Adult deaf survivor
- Minor survivor
- 2 Spanish speaking survivors

19% of our cases do not have valid identification, 15% have severe mental health, and 12% are pregnant or have a child in their sole custody. Every day, we are working to find solutions to not only help address a survivor's trafficking need, but find a place where all of their individualized needs can be met. By having a national network we can help a survivor find a place where they will not just survive by thrive.

EMERGENCY SERVICES

A SURVIVOR'S JOURNEY TO FREEDOM

Anna was sexually abused by a family member at a young age. Her mom died after a long battle with drug addiction which left Anna in the care of Child Services. She was moved from one foster family to the next, suffering continued abuse and neglect.

Her life of trafficking began at the age of 12. This life, along with drug and alcohol abuse, led her to face serious consequences. It was then that Child Services realized that she was living on her own; in a tent.

She never finished high school and spent years in and out of drug rehabs and mental institutions. Her experience has taught her not to trust or depend on anyone. However, she put her trust in us. For that, we are so grateful.

Over the last 2 weeks, we supported her as she traveled over 3,000 miles. Her true willingness for change helped her endure 2 emergency shelters, 1 hotel, 5 Ubers, 2 buses and 2 planes. Her giving spirit continued to shine through her tears as she would share her lunch with a homeless man in exchange for conversation or using some of her food allowance to buy cat food for the strays that kept her company during the day.

SHP staff spent countless hours on the phone with her during times of crisis (and occasionally times of boredom). She would often reveal a simple child-like remark that reminded us of the childhood she never got to experience.

This morning, we checked her into a Safe House where she can begin healing and recovery. Now at 25 years old, Anna has dreams of becoming a Peer Support Specialist where she can use her own life experiences to help young women struggling with sexual abuse, addiction, mental health, and homelessness.

Her perseverance is a true inspiration to everyone that she encounters and we have no doubt that she will continue to make a significant difference in the lives of many.
