LEADING WITH VISION CULTIVATING EXCELLENCE

Dear Friends of Safe House Project,

Trafficking is a scourge in our nation. In 2017, Health & Human Services estimated that 300K American kids are trafficked every year and that this evil was going unchecked, with only 1% identified. Of the few who are identified, 80% were revictimized without access to a safe place to heal.

Today, Safe House Project is leading a national offensive approach. We are refusing to settle for freedom for some, justice for a few, and penalties for a fraction of traffickers. We believe everyone deserves to find hope, freedom, and a future free of victimization.

In 2023, we made substantial strides in increasing survivor identification rates. Through new and continued collaborative partnerships with law enforcement agencies, NGOs, and community organizations, we equip frontline workers, educators, healthcare professionals, and businesses with the tools they need to recognize and report trafficking.

As a result, we have served 534 survivors in 2023, a 345% increase in requests to our Survivor Support team. That's 534 survivors who have reclaimed their lives and are now journeying in freedom toward their dreams. These survivors found refuge in safe houses that we have supported as they increased capacity or decreased barriers to care. Over the past five years, your support has helped launch 478 beds in safe house programs to provide holistic care, providing 174K safe nights annually.

To drive sustainability, we have worked to advance the state and federal response to trafficking through policy. Spearheading a national effort through the Trafficking Survivor Equity Coalition, we saw Congress pass the Trafficking Victim Protection Reauthorization Act of 2022.

Trafficking remains an ever-adapting enemy, and we have an ever-growing belief that we can push back the

darkness with light and eradicate child sex trafficking in America. Our audacious belief is not unfounded. It is rooted in the power of unity, compassion, and collective action. Great movements begin with someone believing in the impossible.

The eradication of slavery in America ended with the passage of the Emancipation Proclamation. Still, it started because of people like Charles Adam, a publisher who changed the hearts and minds of the nation with his publications. Richard Allen, a former slave and pastor, elevated the idea that people of all skin colors had dignity, value, and worth as human beings, not as commodities. Levi Coffin used his fortune and status as a covering to help thousands of slaves escape. Lydia Maria Child, a school teacher and author, used her magazine to call for the freedom of slaves. Harriet Tubman found freedom and risked everything to help others. School teachers, pastors, business leaders, survivors, and social influencers dared to push back the darkness to see change for a nation.

Today, we stand in their legacy, recognizing that we can solve complex issues through the power of the collective and the courage of everyone. While we celebrate the progress made in 2023, we realize that the road ahead is long and challenging. As we look ahead to 2030, our commitment to eradicating child sex trafficking remains steadfast. In the coming year, we will expand our survivor support programs, invest in technology to enhance survivor identification, and strengthen our partnerships. Thank you for living courageously and being part of the collective action to end child trafficking.

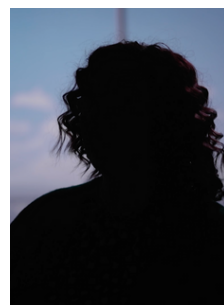

Safe House Project has trained over 300K people across all 50 United States to increase survivor identification. Industry-specific training for essential workers like healthcare professionals, educators, law enforcement, and in-home service providers, as well as general training for the public, empowers people to spot, report, and prevent trafficking in their daily lives.

SURVIVOR SUPPORT EVERY STORY MATTERS

The Emergency Survivor Support Team helps to create opportunities and remove barriers for survivors to leave a trafficking situation. Even if they are physically able to leave exploitation, many survivors face incredible barriers to exiting and accessing the care they need to remain in freedom. The SHP team receives dozens of calls every month from survivors looking for assistance as they exit trafficking. Working with law enforcement and other industry partners, the Emergency Survivor Support Team facilitates these courageous survivors' safe exit and transportation to restorative care in a safe house program. Ironically, the ads marketing Maya for sale actually led to her recovery. An undercover police officer found the ads, recognized Maya as far too young to be selling sex, and found her going in and out of rooms at a cheap motel. While it took a while for Maya to understand that her boyfriend was really her trafficker, she now lives in a restorative care program that is helping her rediscover who she is and how she deserves to be treated. She's come a long way from the motel where the police first found her and referred her to the Safe House Project team, and she has finally begun to hope for a better future, one free from exploitation.

SURVIVOR STORY

NAME CHANGED FOR PRIVACY



Ana knew that she needed a lot of help managing her disabilities and that her grandmother wasn't up to the task. She started looking for connection in all the wrong places, staying out for days at a time with older men. They gave her money if she promised not to tell about the men who visited her. She kept their secrets until community members reported seeing a young girl with older men in parks at night. The police contacted the Safe House Project team for help, but finding a safe house able to care for Ana's disabilities was a challenge. After months of waiting, Ana is safely living in a program and receiving the help she needed all along.

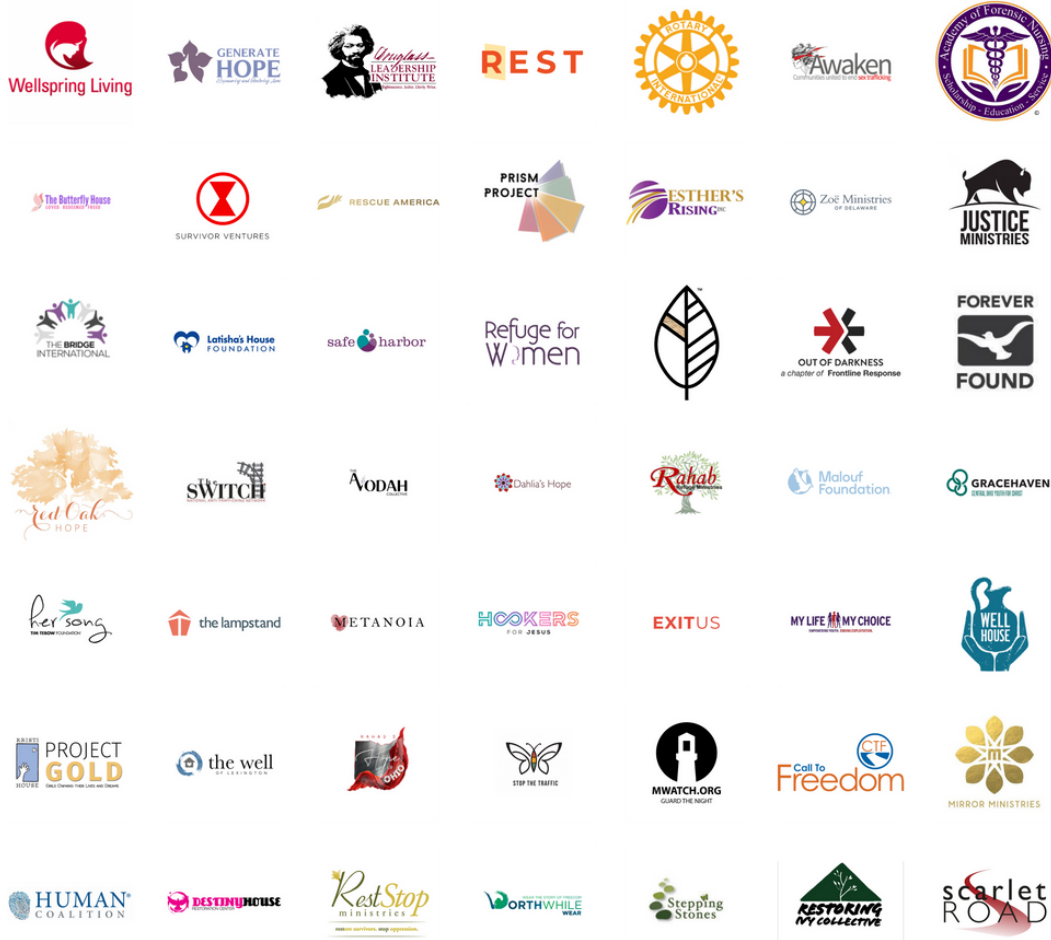

TRAFFICKING SURVIVOR EQUITY COALITION

The Trafficking Survivor Equity Coalition (TSEC) brings survivor-informed and anti-trafficking-field-informed policy recommendations to educate lawmakers on how to effectively prevent trafficking, protect trafficking survivors through equitable and inclusive services, and prosecute traffickers through effective legislation. TSEC supports a holistic approach to serving human trafficking survivors and elevating lived experience experts in the United States.

This year the Trafficking Survivor Equity Coalition continued its extraordinary efforts to equip lawmakers to combat trafficking through policy. As a result of their tremendous advocacy, the President signed the Trafficking Victims Prevention and Protection Reauthorization Act of 2022 in January. This legislation authorizes more than \$1 Billion in funding to mobilize America's domestic and international initiatives to prevent trafficking, prosecute traffickers and buyers and protect victims.

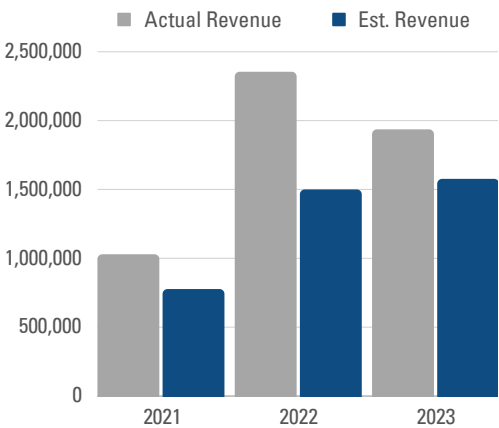

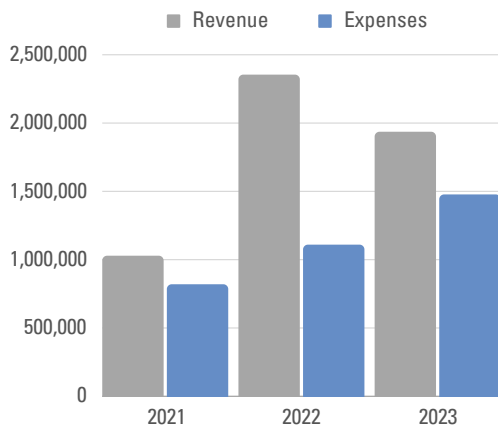


YEAR-OVER-YEAR FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

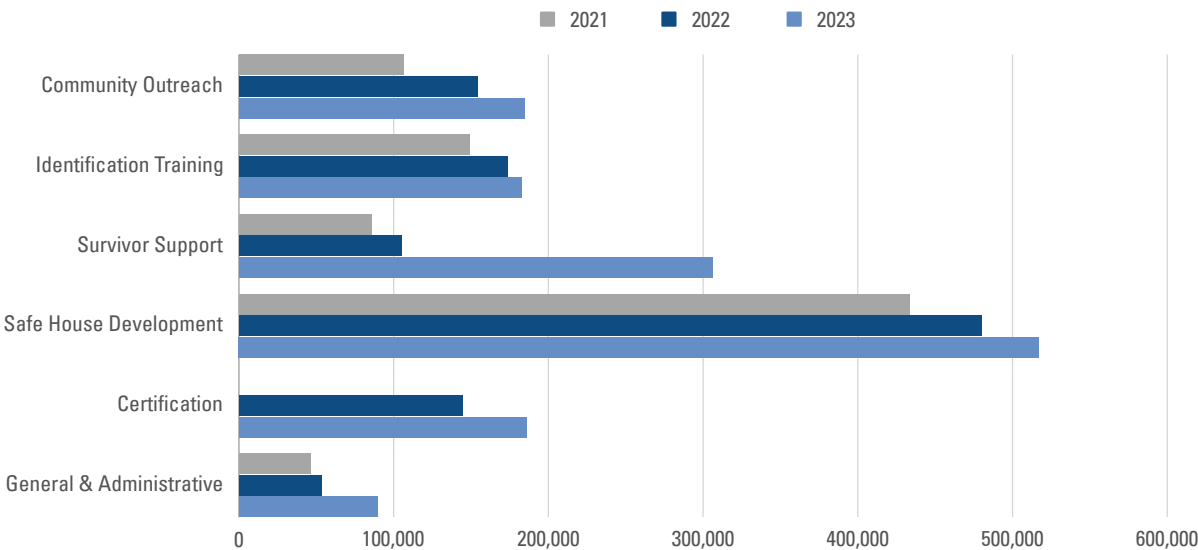
YEAR-OVER-YEAR REVENUE COMPARISON

YEAR-OVER-YEAR EXPENSES BREAKDOWN



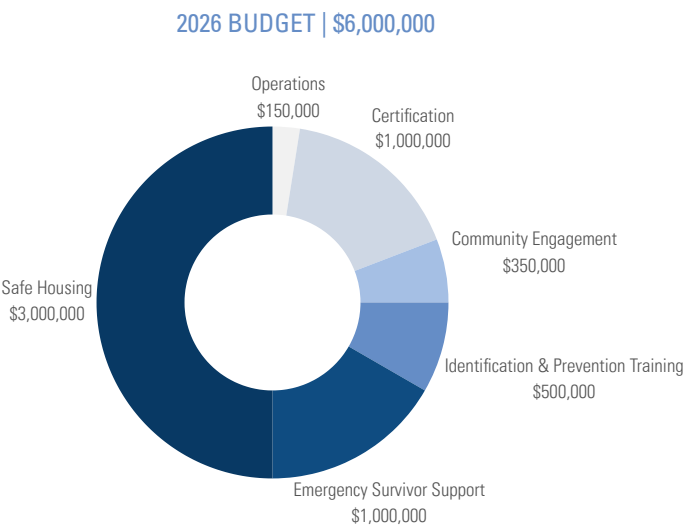
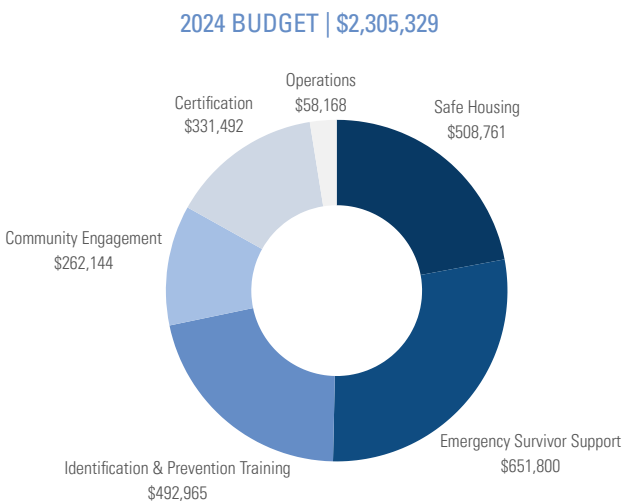
FUNDING THE FUTURE STRATEGIC GROWTH & IMPACT

Each year, Safe House Project continues to push the boundaries of possibility, galvanizing communities and driving impact that changes the course of history. Doing this requires integrity, innovation, collaboration, hope, and stewardship.

Our goals and projections for 2024 are guided by the compass of these values:

- Serve 1,000 survivors in their exit from a trafficking situation and placement in a restorative safe house program.
- Increase the national capacity of safe house programs by an additional 100 beds.
- Certify 50 safe house programs across the United States.
- Provide mentorship for certified safe house programs to elevate the quality of care to meet the highest level of standards.
- Partner with lawmakers to introduce and advance comprehensive human trafficking legislation in 3 states.
- Advance the deployment of all SHP training solutions to see 50,000 people trained to identify and respond to trafficking.

Our 2024-2026 plan will grow our annual operating budget to \$6 million in 2026.

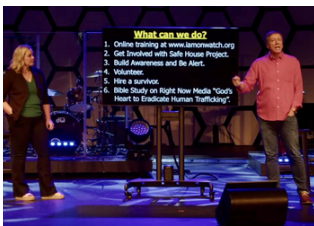
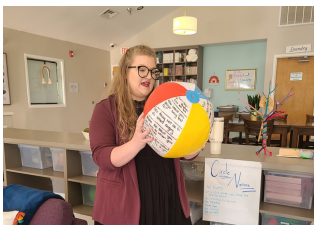
